

The Greatest Myth On Voting (and How It's Hurting Your Children)

Myth: If I register to vote, I will have to serve jury duty.

<u>Truth</u>: You may be called to jury duty regardless of whether you are registered to vote. The County picks you from many publicly available lists. This includes if you have a **Georgia driver license**, belong to a local church, have a library card, own a home etc.

The only people who can seek an exemption from jury duty are those that are 70 years or older, those who have a doctor's affidavit stating they are permanently mentally or physically disabled, or elected officials during legislative session.

How does this hurt my children? You sacrificed so much to come to America so your kids would have the best chance at success. Out of all the sacrifices you make for your children, the easiest one is voting – so why would you throw it away? Voting is the best way to push for laws that lower the cost of college education, ensure equality in hiring and promotion, and increase job opportunities for Korean workers. Most importantly, you will show by example what it means to be a leader in America, which requires being active in "mainstream" society by not being afraid to exercise your political power.
